## PRESENTATIONS:

1. Fechter & Company, Certified Public Accountants to present audit report for fiscal year ended June 30, 2022 - CPA Castroville CSD's annual financial audit for fiscal year ended June 30, 2022 was recently completed and presented to the Board of Directors by Certified Public Accountant Scott German with Fechter & Company. A copy of the audit can be viewed as an attachment to the December 20, 2022 board packet on the District website. Per Mr. German, Castroville CSD received a clean audit and opinion, which is issued by an auditor when the financial statements presented are free from material misstatements and are represented fairly in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GASB). In other words, Castroville CSD's financial condition, position, and operations are fairly presented in their financial statements. It is the best type of report opinion an auditee may receive from an external auditor. He informed the Board that they did not experience any difficulties or delays with management, in turn they have been very cooperative, responsive and are doing a great job. Mr. German reviewed the audit report with the Board and answered any questions the Board had regarding the audit report for fiscal year end June 30, 2022. Annual adjustment made to the financial statements will be to the pension and to the post retirement benefit accounts from actuarial reports. He also informed the Board that his firm tested the following: balance sheet, cash receipts, accounts receivable, accounts payable, payroll and reviewed banks statements as part of internal controls. They selected transactions at random to review and found no such indications of errors or fraud. Once again, Mr. German also wanted to thank Castroville CSD management for being very cooperative, transparent and having all the data ready for them to view.

6. Discuss proposed water service intertie with Marina Coast Water District – Director Ron Stefani along with the rest of the Board concurred that Marina Coast Water District has never discussed with the Castroville CSD Board of Directors on a proposed water service intertie with them and needs to be discussed in more detail. Per newspaper articles written, specifically the Monterey County Weekly it appears they are building a narrative that they are going to save Castroville CSD. General Manager Eric Tynan stated he could request the Marina Coast Water District General Manager to attend a board meeting to see if he would like to discuss the proposed water service intertie further with the

Castroville CSD Board. At this time the Board directed General Manager Eric Tynan to instead respond to the Marina Coast General Manager and let him know that Castroville CSD has no agreement with them on a proposed water service intertie, has not decided what the Board wants to do and would want to own its own intertie line and able to disconnect the line if needed.

7. Consider approving new changes in Noland Hamerly Etienne & Hoss (NHEH) Attorneys at Law hourly rates from \$290/hour to \$340/hour, effective January 1, 2023 – General Manager Eric Tynan stated the notice regarding NHEH Billing Rate Increase can be viewed on page 27 of this board packet. General Manager let the Board know that he thought the rate increase was significant. The Board responded that the district does not spend much on legal fees. Notice of Intent to adopt a mitigated negative declaration for Moss Landing Wastewater System Rehabilitation Project filed General Manager Eric Tynan reported to the Board that the Notice of Intent (NOI) to adopt a mitigated negative declaration for Moss Landing Wastewater System Rehabilitation Project was filed on November 18, 2022. This is mostly for work at Station 1. Only one comment has been received and it was from Caltrans. The filed NOI can be viewed on pages 28-32 of this board packet. Director Ron Stefani stated that he believes the NOI also requires Board approval.
- 9. Award contract to Monterey Peninsula Engineering for the Castroville Water Valves Replacement Project, not to exceed \$121,000 - General Manager Eric Tynan informed the Board that he had MNS Engineers handle the bidding requirements for the Castroville Water Valves Replacement Project. Monterey Peninsula Engineering (MPE) was determined to be responsible, responsive per the bidding requirements and the lowest bidder for this. Notice of Intention to Award Contract to MPE and MPE Bid Form for Construction Contract can be viewed on pages 33-42 of this board packet. Director Ron Stefani asked why has a Notice of Intention to Award Contract been sent as the board usually views a list of all the bids that have been submitted and would like to continue to have the board see all the bids submitted before taking any actions in the future. Per General Manger Eric Tynan there were only two other bids received beside MPE who was the apparent low bidder. The Don Chapin Company and Johnson & Company also submitted a bid. Also, Castroville CSD is to provide the valves so the project should be less and will not exceed \$121,000. District to review which valves are most critical, may phase the work over time as bid was almost double the estimated engineers of \$61,000. May only perform the two valves scheduled for the Caltrans Highway 143 project. After some discussion, a motion is made by Ron Stefani and seconded by Glenn Oania to award the contract to Monterey Peninsula Engineering for the Castroville Water Valves Replacement Project not to exceed \$121,000. ## **UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

Update on Well levels – General Manager Eric Tynan reported to the Board that the well levels report
can be viewed on page 43 of this board packet. Per the graph, Well levels rebounded from last month's
well levels graph. As mentioned prior, the District continues to monitor the chloride levels of all the wells.
Chloride levels are rising, which is a big concern. Well #3 is not pumping and the motor is not hooked
up. A desalter is being considered for Well #3.

- 2. Update on Asset Management and Maintenance Projects (Castroville Water Valves Replacement Project and Maggiora Bros. Drilling Inc. for the Replacement of Well #4 Pump) - General Manger Eric Tynan reported to the Board Monterey Peninsula Engineering was the apparent low bidder for the Castroville Water Valves Replacement Project. Maggiora Brothers Drilling is still waiting for parts to arrive. Once the parts needed have arrived, Maggiora Brothers Drilling will be installing a new submersible pump at Well #4 and converting it from oil to water lubrication. MNS Engineers will assist as needed with the projects listed on the Action Plan report for Asset Management and Maintenance Project, which can be viewed on pages 44-45 of this board packet.
- Update on DWR Desal grant application General Manager Eric Tynan informed the Board the DWR Desal grant application was prepared and submitted by MNS Engineers in October 2022. MNS Engineers is following up with the status of the grant application which is on-going. Update on status of grants for Moss Landing-Sewer Zone 3, Castroville-Sewer Zone 1 and Castroville-Water Zone 1 for system upgrades and improvements -Moss Landing Sewer (No Action Plan obtained): General Manager Eric Tynan reported to the Board as mentioned prior, MNS is finishing up the 60% design and the environmental is underway. MNS is to prepare a construction application following the 60% completion. Ortega approved the sale for the easement for \$10,000 in Moss Landing and the District is still working on finalizing the sale of the easement. The Washington Bypass (Action Plan pages 52-53): As previously mentioned, the State has requested the full application for \$3.5 million projects by mid-July. CCSD approved the environmental proposal from MNS Engineers for this project, which they have been working on. Once the environmental is complete, MNS to submit the funding application for the next phase. Permits are required due to jurisdictional wetlands. Three permits from three Federal agencies are also required. General Manager Eric Tynan sent email on AB52, completed in November 2022. Once the environmental is completed, MNS to submit the funding application for the next phase, spring 2023. As mentioned previously, since the potholing has been completed as well as 60% of the plans, the District has received all the grant funds of \$61,807 from DWR. The District has applied for a grant for finishing the design and construction, California Housing Community Development, Infill Infrastructure Grant and still waiting to hear on the status of this grant. In addition, State Water Resources Control Board, SRF set aside for small disadvantaged communities, "The Small Community Clean Water Waste Water Funding Program." MNS is preparing the application as the State has requested the full application for \$3.5 million. The proposal for Professional Engineering and Constructions Management Services-Washington Sewer Trunk Line Bypass Final Design and Construction (not to exceed \$498,141) is contingent on award of grant to CCSD. Emergency Deep Aquifer Supply and Storage Tank (Action Plan, pages 46-50): As previously mentioned, the District still needs to finalize the purchase of the land that is being acquired from adjacent property owner, which should happen soon since a copy of the grant deed has been obtained from the Monterey County Clerk Recorder's Office and a copy provided to the adjacent property owner. Title Company requirements to finalize purchase: ROW resolution of the general manager (Resolution No. 22-17 already submitted) authority and name change of property owner. The 30% design has been completed as of May 2022. MNS to check back with DWR on the grant and MNS to prepare a Future Grant Application if SCDR is a "no go". MNS also submitted a grant application on behalf of CCSD for the SCDR grant. However, this grant is first come first serve and there are 55 applicants ahead of CCSD. Still, partial funding is a possibility. MNS Engineers to check back with DWR. The CEQA Notice of Exemption for the Castroville CSD to be filed at County Clerk for the Emergency Deep Aquifer Supply and Storage Tank Project. The Overhead Sign at Highway 183 (Action Plan pages 54-55): As mentioned previously, the Board approved the Cooperative Agreement and Maintenance Agreement with Caltrans for the Overhead Sign in October 2022. The State has also requested a traffic control plan and a storm water control plan which was prepared by MNS Engineers and sent to the state. General Manager Eric Tynan will most likely have MNS handling the administration for this project pending board approval. Resolution No. 2022-14, Engaging Signs By Van for the Design, Fabrication, and Installation of the Castroville Landmark Sign was approved. MNS to continue working with Signs By Van and draft a Project Management Professional (PMP), contract, encroachment permit. Castroville issued a check to Signs for Vans for \$40,000 to help him off set cost. The first invoice was submitted to Caltrans on behalf of Castroville CSD from Signs By Van on the 17th of October 2022 for grant reimbursement. Castroville

4. was informed it would take three weeks for funds to be disbursed and approval is still pending. Furthermore, Signs By Van has submitted a second invoice that does not meet with Caltrans guidelines for approval. The Invoice was returned for corrections The action plans were put together by Paul Greenway, G7ei Inc. and have provided a timeline on the status of where the grants are. Current grants awarded are the Clean Water Small Communities Planning Grant (\$500,000) with State Waterboards for administration, preliminary engineering report, plans and specs for sewer in Moss Landing, project assigned to MNS Engineers. The IRWM Implementation Grant (\$395,000) is with DWR for the Deep Well (Well #6) and the use will be specified in the DWR/MCRWA agreement. The DAC Involvement Programs amount \$61,807 with DWR is for the design of the Washington Sewer Bypass for Castroville sewer is also assigned to MNS Engineers. Current funding efforts: Moss Landing sewer system improvements, Castroville emergency well replacement, Castroville water supply improvements and Castroville wastewater improvements.

- 1. Update on Monterey One Water (M1W) board meeting Director Ron Stefani reported that new members will be on the MIW board and Salinas Valley will be losing its power. Tom Moore will be the chairperson. In addition, MIW has everything ready for the Expansion project, which is currently on hold. The Water Purchase Agreement, Cal Am paid 24 million dollars to put in a parallel pipe and pumping equipment to be able to move the expansion water and use it. The ruling a CPUC said they cannot get reimbursed for it. The Expansion project is on hold and costing the Peninsula rate payers more money. MIW also did approve with moving forward on putting the bills on the property taxes to collect the fees.

Re: Recommendations for Department of Water Resources Action Regarding the 180/400ft Aquifer Subbasin Groundwater Sustainability Plan Update

Dear Department of Water Resources (DWR),

The current draft of the Salinas Valley Basin Groundwater Sustainability Agency (SVB GSA) 180/400ft Aquifer Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) Update fails to meet both statutory requirements and DWR's expressed standards and Recommended Corrective Actions as articulated in the 180/400ft Aquifer GSP Determination released in June of 2021. DWR noted, "the recommended corrective actions included in the Staff Report are important to addressing certain technical or policy issues that were raised and, if not addressed before future, subsequent plan evaluations, may preclude approval of the Plan in those future evaluations." Given the multiple inadequacies in the GSP Update, Community Water Center (CWC) and the undersigned groups recommend DWR reject the GSP Update and provide updated recommended corrective actions reflective of best available information.<sup>2</sup>

In November 2019, CWC and San Jerardo Cooperative submitted comments to the SVB GSA on the draft 180/400ft Aquifer GSP. Additionally, in May 2022, CWC submitted an updated comment letter and Technical Review to the SVB GSA.<sup>3</sup> To date, SVB GSA has not addressed

any of our substantive comments in this GSP Update. We urge DWR to incorporate our recommendations, located in the following sections, our May 2022 comment letter, and our May 2022 Technical Review.

# I. The Human Right to Water Must Be Upheld in SGMA Planning and Implementation.

In 2012, California codified the Human Right to Water into law, establishing "[]that every human being has the right to safe, clean, affordable, and accessible water adequate for human consumption, cooking, and sanitary purposes." Under the Water Code Section 106.3, DWR must consider how their actions will impact the Human Right to Water when reviewing GSPs, and should only approve GSPs that protect the Human Right to Water. In order to comply with this obligation, DWR must ensure that the GSP Update does not cause or allow further drinking water crises that interfere with residents' access to an adequate supply of safe drinking water.

As stated in the May 2022 letter, we found that the revised **Domestic Well Impact Analysis** is not representative and potentially obfuscates impacts to domestic well users. SVB GSA has shown in its original plan that it is able to use centroid locations to take into account all (or most) domestic wells in the Subbasin while estimating impacts to domestic wells. As part of this update, the GSP now limits the analysis to just 14 out of 294 wells (i.e., less than 5%). The domestic well impact analysis should be updated to 1) include information from well completion reports in the Monterey County Environmental Health Department records, 2) evaluate impacts to domestic wells with locations available a Public Land Survey System (PLSS) Section-level, 3) include a sensitivity analysis of the potential range of error within a PLSS Section (i.e., calculate the difference between the minimum and maximum contoured groundwater elevations and ground surface elevations within each PLSS Section and present the results), 4) include the information used for the domestic well impact analysis in the GSP for full transparency of the assessment, and 5) apply this analysis to the other Salinas Valley Basin Subbasins. Please see Page 9 of the attached Technical Review for further information.

# II. Existing Groundwater Pumping Practices Exacerbate Seawater Intrusion and Domestic Well Impacts, and Must Be Addressed Urgently.

Of particular concern, the groundwater conditions of the Severely Disadvantaged Community (SDAC) of Castroville continue to worsen with limited action from SVB GSA. As of December

2022, all wells at Castroville Community Services District (CSD) continue to be impacted and/or threatened by seawater intrusion. Castroville has had to disconnect one of their wells due to high levels of chloride in March 2021. Additionally, groundwater level declines are also a serious concern in Castroville, further exacerbating seawater intrusion. Since 1998, the Castroville Seawater Intrusion Project (CSIP) has supplied and delivered recycled water to agriculture in the Castroville area. However, overpumping of nearby wells, including CSIP wells, has contributed to groundwater level declines and seawater intrusion in Castroville. In a letter to the California Public Utilities Commission, Monterey County Water Resources Agency stated,

"Groundwater levels declined in the 180-Foot and 400-Foot Aquifers from August 2020 to August 2021. The greatest declines occurred in the 400-Foot Aquifer in areas near Castroville and Espinosa Lake, which is also the aquifer and geographic area where the most heavily used CSIP supplemental wells are located...Persistent declines in groundwater levels will provide a mechanism for seawater intrusion."

The decline of groundwater levels can exacerbate seawater intrusion, and SVB GSA should evaluate this relationship between sustainability indicators comprehensively, particularly in relation to domestic well impacts. As detailed in our Technical Review, the GSP Update fails to acknowledge the current uncertainty regarding the extent of seawater intrusion in the northern and southern portions of the 180/400ft aquifers, and the proposed groundwater level Minimum Thresholds will not prevent continued seawater intrusion. In this GSP Update, SVB GSA must address overpumping and protect—not further exacerbate—local groundwater levels and quality in Castroville. The following recommendations remain pertinent to protect Castroville's wells and other vulnerable drinking water wells in the 180/400ft Aquifer Subbasin:

- Immediately regulate pumping from nearby wells, including CSIP wells, located in close proximity to Castroville.
- Immediately implement Governor Newsom's March 28 Executive Order on drought, including a plan for coordinating with Monterey County to analyze potential impacts of proposed new wells on drinking water supplies and a moratorium on drilling of new wells (with the exception of replacement drinking water wells) in seawater intruded areas, including the deep aquifer.<sup>7</sup>
  - In August 2022, SVB GSA approved a <u>well permit verification form</u>, but it is not apparent what criteria they are using to determine whether the proposed well is consistent with the GSP. We recommend that SVB GSA post information on well permits and make their investigation criteria available for public review.
- Immediately implement a domestic well mitigation program (see Section IV below).

- Improve the monitoring network in and around vulnerable drinking water wells including in seawater intruded areas and in areas with high drinking water contaminants (see Sections III & V below).

SVB GSA must align with state law and regulations and take immediate steps to bring the Subbasin into sustainability. Until the sustainability plan demonstrates that they will be able to achieve sustainability, DWR should find the plan inadequate.

# III. The Updated 180/400ft Aquifer GSP Fails to Prevent Further Degradation of Water Quality, in Violation of SGMA.

To comply with DWR's Recommend Corrective Action 5 regarding groundwater quality, 8 SVB GSA must dedicate more resources and use state guidance to address groundwater quality issues. In response, SVB GSA has proposed to convene the Water Quality Coordination Group "at least annually." While a step in the right direction, SVB GSA must dedicate more funding and resources to this group to meet more frequently, such as every quarter. Furthermore, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) has provided several resources to address degraded water quality in compliance with SGMA. In November 2022, SWRCB sent a letter to DWR identifying that "many of the GSPs do not comprehensively describe or set appropriate sustainable management criteria (SMC) for groundwater quality." For this Subbasin, SWRCB listed seven constituents: 1,2,3-Trichloropropane, arsenic, Chromium, Hexavalent, Gross Alpha radioactivity, Nitrate as N, Nitrate+Nitrite, and Total Dissolved Solids. We recommend that SVB GSA provide more narrative discussion of constituents other than nitrate, including how their concentrations have varied over time and location, in Section 5.4.

In addition to narrative description, SVB GSA must map out constituents and violations with the best available information. The SWRCB released the SGMA Groundwater Quality Visualization Tool, which shows the location of wells with detections of constituents in the Subbasin. We recommend that the Water Quality Coordination Group use the SGMA Groundwater Quality Visualization Tool to expand the monitoring network to evaluate historic groundwater quality impacts to DACs and include more domestic wells in the monitoring network. SVB GSA must use the best available information to monitor wells impacted by water quality degradation.

Additionally, we recommend that SVB GSA revise their GSP Update to address post-2015 water quality impacts. In the GSP Update, SVB GSA concludes that they are not responsible for exacerbation of water quality degradation because they have not implemented any projects or management actions to date and have refrained from regulating groundwater pumping.<sup>13</sup> This interpretation does not comply with SGMA. As stated by DWR, "SGMA defines sustainable groundwater management as the management and use of groundwater in a manner that can be maintained during the planning and implementation horizon without causing undesirable results." SVB GSA fails to consider how their lack of action could exacerbate existing conditions, in violation of SGMA.

Therefore, DWR should reject the GSP Update and revise Recommended Corrective Action 5 to ensure SVB GSA fills data gaps in a timely and well planned process using the best available information. DWR should also require SVB GSA to take affirmative action to prevent the exacerbation of water quality degradation in the Subbasin, including incorporating the actions we recommended in Section II.

# IV. The Updated 180/400ft Aquifer GSP's Failure to Include Mitigation Measures for Seawater Intrusion and Contamination of Domestic Wells Violates the Human Right to Water.

As explained above, the GSP Update will lead to a loss of drinking water access due to compromised wells and increased contamination. Without a program to mitigate these impacts, the GSP violates the Human Right to Water and must be rejected. DWR has indicated that the Department will release guidance on domestic well mitigation next year and has in the meantime instructed GSAs to refer to the Framework for a Drinking Water Well Impact Mitigation Program developed by Self-Help Enterprises, Leadership Counsel for Justice & Accountability, and Community Water Center. The Framework includes the following components, 1) drinking water well monitoring network, 2) adaptive management system development, 3) drinking water well tool/ model, and 4) public outreach, and 5) mitigation measures including responsive changes in groundwater management. We recommend that SVB GSA design a mitigation program that focuses on the prevention of impacts to domestic wells using an adaptive management trigger system. Throughout the State, communities are facing a backlog of well drilling. Without any mitigation program, the domestic wells are still being compromised and SVB GSA fails to dedicate resources to address seawater intruded and contaminated wells.

While a step in the right direction, the SVB GSA's proposed Dry Well Notification System only provides minimal support after a well has already been dewatered. If it is also unclear why SVB GSA is focusing on dry wells when no dry wells were reported in Monterey County this year. The urgent concerns for this Subbasin are seawater-intrusion and contamination of wells as described in previous sections. The Dry Well Notification System fails to account for wells impacted by seawater intrusion and degraded water quality. SVB GSA must prioritize resources to create a robust mitigation program that focuses on addressing current impacts to domestic wells, including water quality impacts. A mitigation program should include clearly articulated performance standards that commit to protecting all domestic wells. For example, the program must include binding standards in the GSP Update, such as a commitment to provide emergency bottled water for all well failures, to haul water for any longer-term outages, and to fund long-term solutions for clusters of shallow wells consistently at risk of being compromised, so that the public and DWR can have certainty that the future development of the mitigation plan could be successful if implemented.

# V. SVB GSA's Inadequate Representative Monitoring in the 180/400ft Aquifer Subbasin Does Not Capture All Beneficial Uses and Users in the Subbasin.

We appreciate that Section 4.1.2 of the 2021 Annual Report describes progress to increase monitoring. However, SVB GSA must include more domestic wells and small water systems in the monitoring network. The GSP Update and staff responses to our comments fail to meet the best available science standard in SGMA by stating that SVB GSA "may" incorporate them. SVB GSA must change "may" to "will" in order to use the best available information and capture all beneficial uses and users in the Subbasin.

As previously requested by DWR and CWC, this GSP Update, as well as future Annual Reports, should lay out a concrete plan and timeline to develop an adequate monitoring network and justification for why the proposed monitoring network will be sufficient. We again recommend that the SVB GSA use the SGMA Groundwater Quality Visualization Tool to expand the groundwater quality monitoring network. Additionally, this GSP Update and future Annual Reports should evaluate and acknowledge the uncertainty that current gaps in monitoring introduce into the GSP's current analysis.

# VI. The GSP Contains an Incomplete Incorporation of Climate Change Models that Renders the Water Budget Unreliable and Threatens a Path to Sustainability.

Following the best available science standard, SVB GSA must update climate change modeling as soon as it is available instead of waiting for the statutory 5-year update, particularly if the SVB GSA intends to delay that update to 2027 to match the other Subbasins' schedules. In the meantime, SVB GSA should analyze the potential outcomes of the other likely climate scenarios, as they are equally likely, yet would have drastically different outcomes. In this GSP Update, SVB GSA states that a drier 2070 would not likely change the management approach at this time. However, SVB GSA only uses the 2070 central tendency scenario and fails to consider the extreme dry 2070 scenario. A drier 2070 will affect the management approach that is required to ensure all sustainability criteria will be met. The fact that the GSA does not think a drier long-term climate scenario would affect their current strategy lacks any basis in evidence, fails to use best available science, and demonstrates that the GSA does not have a robust plan to achieve sustainability.

Furthermore, Section 9.9 admits that balancing the water budget will not stop seawater intrusion, even without accounting for sea level rise. At a minimum, anticipated sea level rise should be factored into the GSA's calculations regarding seawater intrusion. Without an evidence-based approach, the GSA's chances of successfully bringing the Subbasin into balance are severely compromised.

# VII. CWC Extends Support for Further Consultation.

As currently written, the GSP Update continues to lack critical policies to protect drinking water users and, as a result, does not comply with SGMA and other applicable state laws. We recommend DWR reject the GSP Update and provide updated recommended corrective actions. We welcome the opportunity to discuss our concerns with DWR. We hope to successfully work with SVB GSA, communities, and DWR to ensure that groundwater management is equitable and sufficiently protective of vital drinking water resources.

Yes, if the decision making body (i.e. the Board) is approving a project with a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) ) it needs to formally vote to "adopt" the Mitigated Negative Declaration with the required findings set forth in CEQA Guideline 15074 (copy attached), including that on the basis of the whole record before it (including the initial study and any comments received), that there is no evidence that the project will have a significant effect on the environment and that the mitigated negative declaration reflects the lead agency's independent judgment and analysis. There are other requirements, as well that need to be met in Guideline 15074.

The vote to "adopt" the MND can be included with other approvals in a single Resolution approving the project, i.e. Resolution to Approve...[Project] ...and Adopt [MND].... as part of the overall Resolution on the project approval, but adopting the MND needs its own separate findings and evidence in the Resolution

The District should also file a Notice of Determination (NOD) with the County Clerk stating they adopted the MND within 5 days of the adoption. Filing the NOD starts the 30 day statute of limitations in which to challenge the Board decision to adopt the MND. Without filing a NOD, the statute of limitations is 180 days.

Section 15074 - Consideration and Adoption of a Negative Declaration or Mitigated Negative Declaration

- (a) Any advisory body of a public agency making a recommendation to the decisionmaking body shall consider the proposed negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration before making its recommendation.
- (b) Prior to approving a project, the decisionmaking body of the lead agency shall consider the proposed negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration together with any comments received during the public review process. The decisionmaking body shall adopt the proposed negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration only if it finds on the basis of the whole record before it (including the initial study and any comments received), that there is no substantial evidence that the project will have a significant effect on the environment and that the negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration reflects the lead agency's independent judgment and analysis.
- (c) When adopting a negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration, the lead agency shall specify the location and custodian of the documents or other material which constitute the record of proceedings upon which its decision is based.
- (d) When adopting a mitigated negative declaration, the lead agency shall also adopt a program for reporting on or monitoring the changes which it has either required in the

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comprehensive airport land use plan has not been adopted, for a project within two nautical miles of a public airport or public use airport, without first considering whether the project will result in a safety hazard or noise problem for persons using the airport or for persons residing or working in the project area.

(f) When a non-elected official or decisionmaking body of a local lead agency adopts a negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration, that adoption may be appealed to the agency's elected decisionmaking body, if one exists. For example, adoption of a negative declaration for a project by a city's planning commission may be appealed to the city council. A local lead agency may establish procedures governing such appeals.



CalFresh (food) and CARE (energy) is a great idea, but the state should handle it," stated ACWA's veto request letter. "It makes no sense for thousands of local water agencies to handle auto enrollment as SB 222 proposes instead of one state agency handling it." The veto letters also underscored the lack of a funding source for the program, and Newsom focused on that issue in his veto message.

"I commend the author and stakeholders for their work during this Legislative session to craft a vision for such a program," Newsom wrote. "However, this bill does not have any funding identified, and because it is an ongoing program that would require all community water systems and wastewater systems to participate, signing this policy would result in significant General Fund pressures in the billions of dollars to continuously provide such assistance."

ACWA maintained an oppose-unless-amended position on the bill, which would have potentially required a California Environmental Quality Act analysis for each well application and possibly created legal liability for groundwater sustainability agencies.

# On the Move

Phil's Fish Market is gone from Moss Landing, and Phil DiGirolamo is happy.

hil feels lucky. It's a Friday afternoon and the dining room is in motion. Guests find tables as others leave, amounting to a full house over an extended lunch rush. Outside people follow GPS beacons, their cell phones leading them around the corner toward the restaurant entrance.

Meanwhile, an SUV rolls carefully down Merritt Street. A few more blocks and the vehicle and its passengers-a family packed front and backwill be among the farms northeast of town. A few minutes later the same gray four-door returns, just as slowly. This time a finger points from a passenger window.


"We get a little walking traffic and car traffic," observes Phil DiGirolamo, the restaurant's owner. "We didn't have that in Moss Landing."

Just a few weeks after opening in its new downtown Castroville location, Phil's Fish Market has been found by its legion of regulars-although, without obvious signage, some electronic assistance or a few passes down the main drag before you catch a glimpse of the place are a part of the process.

Castroville would seem an unlikely location for a long-time bayside destination. The nearby highway intersection is well traveled, but for the most part with cars and trucks headed elsewhere. Furrows of vegetables that radiate from the town are more suggestive of a salad bowl than fresh seafood.

Yet DiGirolamo is quick to point out that his corner lot is just three miles from Moss Landing. And the catch hardly suffers.

"Instead of delivery from a forklift, we get it from a little van," he says.



"We came out ahead," Phil's Fish House owner Phil DiGirolamo says of the restaurant's new location in Castroville. "We're very fortunate."

Indeed, Phil's Fish House already feels settled in its new home. There's a patina to the 1869 building and its many lives-including several years as an Italian restaurant-that suits the establishment. Familiar faces greet guests, and those seated around modest tabletops wave and call as friends enter the dining room.

It's as if Phil's has been tucked into the space for decades rather than weeks. The menu remains the sameextensive, with standout features that those in the know gravitate toward. such as fish and chips, charbroiled salmon and halibut tacos. The kitchen still offers clam chowder, in both New England and Manhattan styles. Perhaps most importantly, the family-recipe cioppino that gained national fame for the place when DiGirolamo topped celebrity chef Bobby Flav in a 2009 Food Network throwdown continues to reign.

# "The vibes are really good,"

"The vibes are really good," DiGirolamo observes. "The building has a nice feel to it; you feel comfortable."

A building with history dating back before the intrusion of modernity is fitting. DiGirolamo has conformed as software became a necessary presence in the industry, but it is a grudging accommodation. When he looks at his desktop computer and considers the

shackles that come with it, DiGirolan sometimes plots revenge.

"I want to throw my coffee cup at it," he says with a chuckle. "It's like being married."

Otherwise, the transition went smoothly, something that's not really supposed to happen. The veteran staff-a few have been with DiGirolamo for a couple of decadesadapted quickly to the new pattern.

Phil's lost only two months betwee shutting down in Moss Landing and coming back to life in Castroville. And the restaurant gained a dedicated parl ing lot out back, along with plenty of

seating indoors and out.

There are finishing touches that remain. DiGirolamo expects to bring a fish market counter back at some poin in the near future. And he's patient as the application for a beer and wine license winds its way toward approval pointing out that people are drawn to Phil's for its menu offerings. Finally, whether tourists will also follow Phil's to Castroville, DiGirolamo isn't certair

However, he is clearly happy with where Phil's landed.

It's been 40 years since DiGirolamo first opened in a cramped Moss Landing spot. "In my mind, I had this image-pretty much what we're doing today," he says. "This building has a lot of happiness in it." \*



Since then, the District has identified additional required improvements for the system, including additional manhole repair and air release valve upgrades; and

WHEREAS, these critical upgrades are necessary not only to improve the reliability of the MLWWS, but also to reduce the potential for unexpected leaks and/or breakages to affect nearby environmental resources such as Elkhorn Slough, Moss Landing Harbor, and the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary; and

WHEREAS, the District's proposes to construct the proposed Moss Landing Wastewater System Rehabilitation Project ("Project"), which Project involves the replacement or rehabilitation of existing facilities that are part of the MLWWS. The Project is intended to optimize the existing system to serve existing demand and would not serve additional growth or new demand. The proposed system improvements are described in Initial Study-Mitigated Negative Declaration ("IS-MND") prepared for the Project and the preliminary Project plans are attached to the IS-MND in Appendix A; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (Public Resources Code, §21000 et seq.) and the State CEQA Guidelines (California Code of Regulations, Title 14, §15000 et seq.) (collectively, "CEQA"), an Initial Study analyzing all potential impacts of the Project was prepared for the District's consideration as the lead agency under State CEQA Guidelines Section 15063; and

WHEREAS, on the basis of the Initial Study, which indicated that all potential environmental impacts from the Project would be less than significant with the incorporation of the mitigation measures in the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program ("MMRP"), District staff determined that a Mitigated Negative Declaration ("MND") should be prepared; and

WHEREAS, the Draft Initial Study-MND was prepared in accordance with CEQA and circulated for public review and comment between November 18, 2022 through December 19, 2022; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21081.6 and State CEQA Guidelines Section 15074(d), a MMRP has been prepared for the Project, a copy of which is attached; and

WHEREAS, all comments on the Draft Initial Study-MND submitted by members of the public as well as any responsible, trustee, and interested agencies during the public review period for the Draft Initial Study-MND were received, considered and responded to; and

WHEREAS, the Final Initial Study-MND consists of the responses to comments and the Initial Study-MND; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors conducted a duly noticed public meeting on January 17, 2023 to consider the proposed Project and its potential environmental impacts, the Final Initial Study-MND, MMRP, and all oral and written evidence presented to it during all meetings; and

WHEREAS, all of the findings and conclusions made by the District Board of Directors pursuant to this Resolution are based upon the oral and written evidence before it as a whole; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors has reviewed the Final Initial Study-MND, the MMRP, and all other relevant information contained in the administrative record regarding the Project, and no comments or additional information submitted to the Board of Directors, and no other circumstances have produced substantial new information requiring substantial revisions that would trigger recirculation of the Draft Initial Study-MND or additional environmental review of the Project under State CEQA Guidelines Section 15073.5; and

WHEREAS, all other legal prerequisites to the adoption of this Resolution have occurred.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Castroville Community Services District Board of Directors hereby finds:

1. CEQA (Mitigated Negative Declaration) - On the basis of the whole record before the Castroville Community Services District's Board of Directors (including the Final Initial Study-Mitigated Negative Declaration ["IS-MND"], comments received, and the administrative record), the Final IS-MND has been completed in compliance with CEQA and there is no substantial evidence that the Moss Landing Wastewater System Rehabilitation Project ("Project") as designed and mitigated, will have a significant effect on the environment. The Final IS-MND reflects Board's the independent judgment and analysis.

#### **EVIDENCE:**

- d) An MMRP has been prepared to ensure compliance during Project implementation, and is hereby incorporated herein by reference. The District shall be responsible for implementing the MMRP throughout the duration of project construction and operation.
- e) The Draft IS-MND for Moss Landing Wastewater System Rehabilitation Project ("Project") was prepared in accordance with CEQA and circulated for public review from November 18, 2022

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- through December 19, 2022. Comments from the California State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) and California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) were received.
- f) Tribal Cultural Resources In accordance with Public Resources Code Section 21080.3.1, often referred to as Assembly Bill 52-Native Americans: CEQA, non-exempt projects subject to environmental review shall request a Tribal Consultation to determine if potential impacts to tribal cultural resources exist. On October 31, 2022, CCSD staff held a consultation meeting with the Rumsen Am:a Tu:rataj Olone (RATO). The RATO indicated the cultural importance and sensitivity of the Moss Landing area to the Tribe. To reduce potential impacts to tribal cultural resources to a less than significant level, mitigation measures recommended by RATO for Native American monitoring and procedures for unanticipated discoveries of tribal cultural resources have been incorporated. The project as proposed and mitigated would have a less than significant impact to tribal cultural resources.
- g) <u>Caltrans</u> Comments received and responses provided in the Responses to Comments included with the Final IS-MND.
- h) <u>SWRCB</u> Comments received and responses provided in the Responses to Comments included with the Final IS-MND.
- i) <u>California Coastal Commission</u> No comments received.
- j) Members of the Public No comments received.
- k) Issues that were analyzed in the IS-MND include: aesthetics, agriculture and forestry resources, air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, energy, geology/soils, greenhouse gas emissions, hazards/hazardous materials, hydrology/water quality, land use/planning, mineral resources, noise, population/housing, public services, recreation, transportation/traffic, tribal cultural resources, utilities/service systems, and wildfire.
- The project was found to have no impact on agriculture and forestry resources, energy, land use/planning, mineral resources, population and housing, public services, recreation, transportation, and wildfire.
- m) The Project was identified to have less than significant impacts on aesthetics, air quality, energy, greenhouse gas emissions, hazards/hazardous materials, hydrology/water quality, noise, transportation, and utilities/service systems.
- n) The project was found to have potential impacts to biological, cultural, paleontological, and tribal cultural resources as well as noise, and mitigation measures have been incorporated to reduce impacts to these resources to a less-than-significant level.
- o) Evidence that has been received and considered includes: the technical studies/reports, the Draft and Final IS-MND, and staff report that reflect the CCSD's independent judgment, and information and testimony presented during the public hearing. These documents are on file with the CCSD and are hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- p) Staff analysis contained in the IS-MND and the record as a whole indicate the project could result in changes to the resources listed in Section 753.5(d) of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) regulations. All land development projects that are subject to environmental review are subject to a State filing fee plus the County recording fee, unless CDFW determines that the project will have no effect on fish and wildlife resources. The Draft IS-MND was sent to CDFW for review and comment and to recommend necessary conditions to protect biological resources in this area. No comments were received.
- q) CCSD, located at 11497 Geil Street, Castroville, California, 95012, is the custodian of documents and other materials that constitute the record of proceedings upon which the decision to adopt the IS-MND is based.
- r) The Project plans and related support materials prepared by CCSD for the proposed Moss Landing Wastewater System Rehabilitation Project.



The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), District 5, Development Review, has reviewed the Washington Street Sewer Bypass Project MND which proposes the installation of a 24-inch trunk sewer main within Caltrans right of way at State Route 1 and State Route 183 in Castroville. Caltrans offers the following comments in response to the MND:

- All work in, on, under, over, or affecting State highway right of way is subject to a Caltrans encroachment permit. For more information regarding the encroachment permit process, please visit our Encroachment Permit Website at: <a href="https://dot.ca.gov/caltrans-near-me/district-5/district-5-programs/d5-encroachment-permits">https://dot.ca.gov/caltrans-near-me/district-5/district-5-programs/d5-encroachment-permits.</a>
- 2. Depending on the complexity of the project improvements requiring an encroachment permit, Caltrans Oversight may be the more appropriate avenue for project review and approval by Caltrans. The District Permit Engineer has been granted authority by Caltrans to make this decision. Please consult with the District Permit Engineer Eileen Stephens at Eileen. Stephens@dot.ca.gov to determine the most appropriate Caltrans project permitting system.
- 3. All work will need to conform to the Caltrans Encroachment Permits Manual, Chapter 600. Additional utility installation requirements, which may apply, are found in Chapter 17 of the Project Development Procedures Manual. Deviations to Caltrans Encroachment Permit Policies may require an exception. This requirement and process will be outlined by the District Permit Engineer in your pre-submittal conference.

- 4. General Basis of Horizontal and Vertical Control Caltrans datums shall be used and observed for the construction of the proposed improvements. All plans shall be in US feet and follow the datums as follows: Vertical Basis: NAVD 88 Horizontal: NAD83 Zone 3 Santa Cruz County, Zone 4 Monterey and San Benito County, and Zone 5 San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara County. At least two recorded, Caltrans monuments must be referenced in the surveying basis.
- 5. All non-operational or vacated pipes shall be removed. The District Permit Engineer may grant waivers to this requirement based on an engineering evaluation.
- 6. Plans shall conform to the Caltrans Plans Preparation Manual and Encroachment Permit Construction Plan Set outline. You will need to show all existing facilities and utilities in plan and profile where your scope of work is located.
- 7. All future documents will be subject to additional evaluation and approval at the time of their review. As part of future evaluation, issues involving or impacting the State right of way may require additional mitigation due to pertinent issues such as cultural resources, environmental justice, water quality, hydrology, etc.




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

#### **Pooled Money Investment Account Monthly Portfolio Composition (1)** 11/30/22 \$203.7 billion


