3. Emergency approval of \$40,000 prepayment to Signs By Van for the Castroville Landmark Sign project – Per General Manager Eric Tynan, Jeremey with Signs By Van requested the board consider advancing him \$40,000. Per Jeremey, he has already invested the funds necessary to purchase the materials needed and furthermore, they are a small business which cannot afford to have this much money tied up until the grant funds are disbursed. Per District Legal Counsel Christine Kemp it appears Signs by Van has already submitted an invoice to CCSO as of 10/17/2022 that has been sent to Caltrans for grant reimbursement. Murat with MNS Engineers reviewed the invoice to verify it met with Caltrans

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requirements and should have an approval in 3 weeks. After some discussion, a motion is made by Ron Stefani and seconded by Glenn Oania to approve a prepayment to Signs By Van on the recently submitted invoice pending reimbursement from Caltrans in the amount of \$40,000. 4. Update on Well levels – General Manager Eric Tynan reported to the Board that the well levels report can be viewed on page 49 of this board packet. Per the graph, Well levels came up again this month with the exception of Well #5. Well #3 is not pumping and the motor is not hooked up. He is considering a desalter for Well #3. Director Ron Stefani stated that he is excited about the opportunity of a desalter.
5. Update on Asset Management and Maintenance Projects – General Manger Eric Tynan reported to the Board that the action plan prepared by MNS Engineers for these projects can be viewed on pages 50-51 of this board packet. The Castroville North Water Services Project was awarded to J Johnson & Company, Inc. which included 28 laterals. J Johnson & Company has completed the work on the laterals and the final inspection has been done for this project. General Manager Eric Tynan stated he is considering doing more work on laterals, especially on the South side of town. Maggiora Brothers Drilling will be installing a new pump submersible at Well #4 and converting it from oil to water lubrication. MNS Engineers will assist as needed with the projects listed on the Action Plan report for Asset Management and Maintenance Project.
6. Update on status of grants for Moss Landing-Sewer Zone 3, Castroville-Sewer Zone 1 and Castroville-Water Zone 1 for system upgrades and improvements – General Manager Eric Tynan reported to the Board that a summary of the action plans/description meeting can be viewed as follows: **Moss Landing Sewer (September 26, 2022 Action Plan meeting, pages 53-54)**. MNS is finishing up the 60% design and the environmental is underway. MNS is to prepare a construction application following the 60% completion. Ortega approved the sale for the easement for \$10,000 in Moss Landing. **The Washington Bypass (September 26, 2022 Action Plan meeting, pages 55-56)**. As mentioned in prior months, the State has requested the full application for \$3.5 million projects by mid-July. CCSD approved the environmental proposal from MNS Engineers for this project. Once the environmental is complete, MNS to submit the funding application for the next phase. Permits are required due to jurisdictional wetlands. Three permits from three Federal agencies are also required, which is on hold a this time. As mentioned previously, since the potholing has been completed as well as 60% of the plans, the District has received all the grant funds of \$61,807 from DWR. The District has applied for a grant for finishing the design and construction, California Housing Community Development, Infill Infrastructure Grant and still waiting to hear on the status of this grant. In addition, State Water Resources Control Board, SRF set aside for small disadvantaged communities, "The Small Community Clean Water Waste Water Funding Program." MNS is preparing the application as the State has requested the full application for \$3.5 million. The proposal for Professional Engineering and Constructions Management Services-Washington Sewer Trunk Line Bypass Final Design and Construction (not to exceed \$498,141) is contingent on award of grant to CCSD. **Emergency Deep Aquifer Supply and Storage Tank (September 26, 2022 Action Plan meeting, pages 57-62)**. As previously mentioned, the District still needs to finalize the purchase of the land that is being acquired from adjacent property owner, which should happen soon since a copy of the grant deed has been obtained from the Monterey County Clerk Recorder's Office and a copy provided to the adjacent property owner. Title Company requirements to finalize purchase: ROW resolution of the general manager (Resolution No. 22-17 approved today) authority and name change of property owner. The 30% design has been completed as of May 2022. MNS to check back with DWR on the grant and MNS to prepare a Future Grant Application if SCDR is a "no go". MNS also submitted a grant application on behalf of CCSD for the SCDR grant. However, this grant is first come first serve and there are 55 applicants ahead of CCSD. Still, partial funding is a possibility. MNS Engineers to check

back with DWR. The CEQA Notice of Exemption for the Castroville CSD to be filed at County Clerk for the Emergency Deep Aquifer Supply and Storage Tank Project. **The Overhead Sign at Highway 183 (September 26, 2022 Action Plan meeting, pages 63-64).** As mentioned previously, the Board approved the draft copy of the Cooperative Agreement and draft copy of the Maintenance Agreement with Caltrans for the Overhead Sign. The State has also requested a traffic control plan and a storm water control plan which was prepared by MNS Engineers and sent to the state for approval. The District is also requesting a constructions schedule from Signs by Van. General Manager Eric Tynan will most likely have MNS handling the administration for this project pending board approval. At this meeting Resolution No. 2022-14, Engaging Signs By Van for the Design, Fabrication, and Installation of the Castroville Landmark Sign was approved. MNS to continue working with Signs By Van and draft a Project Management Professional (PMP), contract, encroachment permit. The action plans were put together by Paul Greenway, G7ei Inc. and have provided a timeline on the status of where the grants are. Current grants awarded are the Clean Water Small Communities Planning Grant (\$500,000) with State Waterboards for administration, preliminary engineering report, plans and specs for sewer in Moss Landing, project assigned to MNS Engineers. The IRWM Implementation Grant (\$395,000) is with DWR for the Deep Well (Well #6) and the use will be specified in the DWR/MCRWA agreement. The DAC Involvement Programs amount \$61,807 with DWR is for the design of the Washington Sewer Bypass for Castroville sewer is also assigned to MNS Engineers. Current funding efforts: Moss Landing sewer system improvements, Castroville emergency well replacement, Castroville water supply improvements and Castroville wastewater improvements.

7. Update on Monterey One Water (M1W) lateral repair – General Manager Eric Tynan notified the Board that there has been no progress or update as M1W is still waiting on getting approval from the Central Coast Water Board before moving forward with this project and State funding. All residents affected have signed a “License Agreement to Enter Property and Inspect Sewer Lateral”. The District would fund cost of design and construction of the sewer main and relocation. M1W would fund design and construction costs of the laterals. The District requested a proposal from MNS for the design fee of the sewer main relocation. The M1W project is part of an enforcement action for M1W by the Central Coast Water Board. The budget for the Private Lateral Rehabilitation Project is \$790,000. The Action Plan for the Cypress Alley Sewer Relocation can be viewed on pages 65-66 of this board packet.

1. Update on Monterey One Water (M1W) board meeting – Director Ron Stefani reported to the Board that at this meeting they mostly spoke about source water. The farmers are upset. If there was any illegal taking of water that legally belonged to the farmers there would be a lawsuit already filed, which has not been found. Pure Water Monterey has been taking the water that they legally have rights to.
2. Update on Salinas Valley Basin Groundwater Sustainability Agency (SVBGSA) meeting – Director Ron Stefani stated again the growers pulled something off the agenda, the Multi-benefit Land Repurposing program. The growers are not too happy about it as they think someone may take their land. He also watched the Eastside basin implementation meeting and they got a presentation from the Pajaro Water Management Agency. They have done a lot of work over there and they are partners with the growers. The other big issue is the feasibility study for the extraction barrier which they are going to be involved with desalting the brackish water. As mentioned prior, the state wants the GSA to be the final well permitting authority and Governor Newsom issued executive order saying the GSA’s approve no new wells. The farmers are not taking this well.
3. Update on meetings or educational classes attended by the Directors – Directors Cosme Padilla and Ron Stefani attended the ACWA Region 5 Program Developments in Monterey County Water Management, October 6, 2022 Tour Event Date and October 7 2022 Program Event Date in Monterey. They toured a seawater desalination plant, pure water treatment plant and heard many speakers the next day that gave a great presentation of water management. General Manager Eric Tynan only attended the Program Event Date as he has already done the tour and had other important meetings to attend.

Members of the Coastal Commission:

I am writing in strong support of the Monterey Peninsula Water Supply Project (MPWSP). The MPWSP will provide a critically-needed, reliable water source for our region. I urge the California Coastal Commission to approve this project to help bring water access to disenfranchised communities, support local conservation efforts, and protect the economic vitality of the Monterey Peninsula.

Source Water for PWMx

When considering future long-term water demand virtually every potential source had conflicting quantity issues except Desal. Wastewater flow is the basis for the Castroville Seawater Intrusion Project, the Pure Water Monterey and PWMx. Wastewater inflow that "Experts" projected to be at 29 MGD currently treats closer to 18 MGD.

In addition, the drought has resulted in empty reservoirs. The Reclamation and Tembladera are dry ditches. The river is not providing a source for the SRDF. There has been no storm water and ground water pumping is depleting the 400' aquifer leading to sea water intrusion and unsustainable water mining of the deep aquifer which are all exacerbated by lack of a new water supply.

North County Water

The attached graph show Castroville's well levels and the dramatic decline due to extractions from CSIP supplemental wells as seen in the MCWRA report. Well #3 (the green trend) in spite of being shut off due to sea water intrusion in May 2021 has a static water level of -90' below sea level. Finally, the tan trend line is our deep well # 5 and shows it is in a steadily decline. The drastic decline of the 400' aquifer in North Monterey County is due to over-pumping caused in part by a lack of recycle water for CSIP that instead went to PWM for the Peninsula.

Long-term water restrictions and the latest drought have continued a building moratorium on the Peninsula resulting in a shortage of affordable housing. Castroville has taken on a large number of affected families who could not find affordable housing on the Peninsula. In Castroville you can often find 2-3 families sharing a 2-bedroom home. In spite of this, Castroville reduced its pumping from 1,010 acft in 2000 to 760 acft in 2021.

If Castroville is being starved so PWM can meet its quota, it is a poor example of the Coastal Commissions dedication to Social Justice.

The Solution:

The three-legged Monterey Peninsula Water Supply Project was/is a WIN-WIN-WIN answer.

- Reduces by 700 AF of pumping directly in front of the 400' Sea Water Intrusion
- Gets the Peninsula off the CDO
- Provides Castroville, a severely disadvantaged community, a long-term, reliable water supply
- Reduces traffic in and out of the Peninsula by allowing people to live in the community they serve
- Provides for critically needed and state mandated affordable housing
- Protection from current and future droughts
- Social justice for both basins

Now, we are left with a lose-lose-lose:

- Unfairly benefits the Peninsula by taking water from a basin that has a greater need and has worked harder to solve its own water issues without taking it from the Carmel River basin.
- Instills animosity and the appearance of entitlement between entities
- Guarantees even more litigation, delay and expense
- No protection from prolonged droughts or effects of global warming
- Does not create a new water source just redirects an existing one

This drought is showing the folly of depending on a 1-legged stool. Both of our water basins are in trouble. It is unfair to take the water from our basin to solve the Peninsula's problem, particularly when it has had decades to resolve this problem and finds every excuse to control growth by limiting the water supply, denying every solution, each one more expensive than the last, and then complaining about the cost.

If the Carmel Valley was being starved of water by North County taking sources to solve its water problem, would the Coastal Commissions consider that social justice?

Castroville receiving Subsidized Water

Finally, Castroville has never asked for or received subsidized water. In fact, CCSD twice turned down any water deal with the MPWSP because we anticipated getting dragged into the never-ending Peninsula Water Politics Insanity (PWPI). Castroville was approached by MPWMD, MCWRA, Mayors Select Water Committee, Landwatch, Surfrider, MCFB, SVWC, and others to please help by taking the in-basin water (fresh water that could not leave the basin) allowing our friends on the Peninsula to stop illegally pumping the Carmel river and get off the CDO.-WIN+WIN.

It was actually cheaper to sell the <5% component of fresh water to Castroville than to pump back in the ground. Castroville still had to come up with millions for a pipeline and risked the source water going 100% salty. With a Median Household Income of \$35K (as confirmed by the 2017 California Rural Water Assoc. MHI survey) Castroville is a confirmed Severely Disadvantaged Community, but we agreed to pay the same cost for pumping from our wells and in return shut off our wells which would reduce the

overdraft in the 400' aquifer by 680 acft thus helping our overdrafted basin some measure of recovery-WIN.


WIN-WIN-WIN

A win for the peninsula, a win for Castroville and a win for our basin. Then, a return to the insanity... Measure J, PWMx and Coastal Commission denial. After measure J, which no one in the Salinas Valley voted for, everyone bailed on us confirming my worst premonition. Instead, CCSD wasted valuable time, money and resources by trying to help our neighbors only to get thrown under the bus. Time in which Seawater intrusion ruined our best well and is now within 1800' or less from our remaining wells. Well, I guess they are correct, no-good deed goes unpunished. Castroville is the "canary in the coal mine" and should be a warning to Coastal staff and others that delaying further a new regional solution in the face of droughts and global warming is reckless.

In the big picture, If we have a water system that impacts the number one industry in your county and we are going through these types of issues, to consider that an adequate resilient water supply, and so we need other sources. Trying to do this with just pure water expansion is a mistake we must look to other sources beyond just Pure One Water, we must have another water system and that is desalination

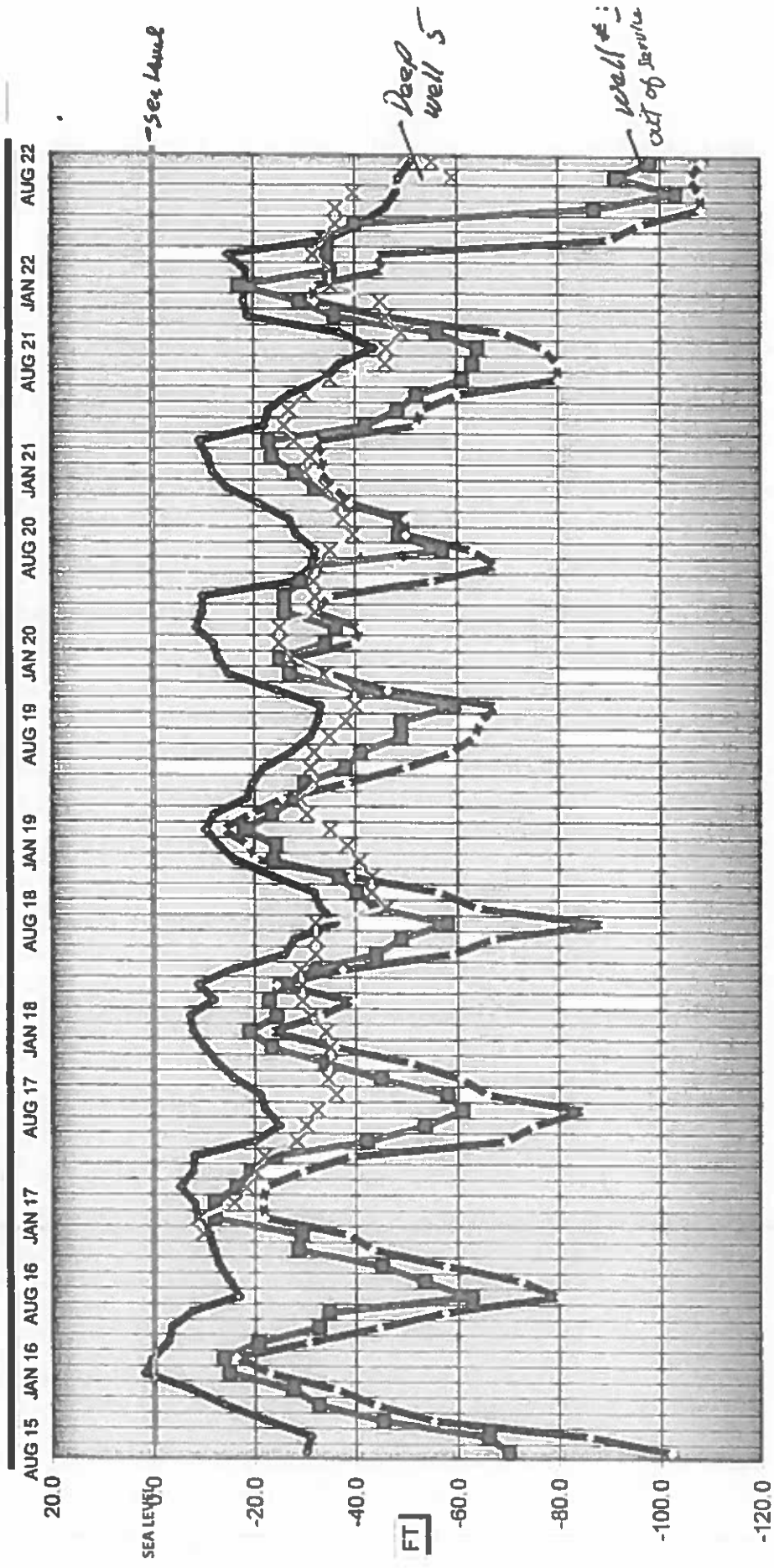

**You are invited to participate in an interview about the potential use of,
and policy for, Demand Management Measures in the
Salinas Valley Groundwater Basin.**

Background: All groundwater subbasins managed by the Salinas Valley Basin Groundwater Sustainability Agency (SVBGSA) are designated by the California Department of Water Resources as high- or medium priority. As required by the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA), the SVBGSA has adopted Groundwater Sustainability Plans (GSP) for each of the subbasins it manages. Each GSP describes sustainable management criteria and sets forth a menu of projects and management actions that will be acted upon with guidance from Subbasin Planning Committees and the SVBGSA Board of Directors (Board). Recent direction from the Board of Directors has identified the importance of exploring through a stakeholder assessment and facilitated discussion with the Executive Committee of the Board the practice of demand management and its application in individual subbasins.

Demand management is not without controversy as it is built around either voluntary or directed restrictions on groundwater use during periods of focused management. How each groundwater basin may approach such actions need to be scoped within the Subbasin Planning Committees and can be guided by an Agency-wide policy defining demand management measures in the context of the subbasin sustainability. The agency-wide policy can describe purpose and mechanics that should be evaluated in pursuing demand management, as well as the outcomes sought for acting on demand management.

As such and while potentially challenging and controversial, it is anticipated that Demand Management Measures (DMM) are a tool that will be pursued within the SVBGSA in some subbasins. A key question is whether a DMM policy, developed by the Board, would be beneficial to guide future refinement and implementation of DMMs in the various subbasins. In each subbasin, the further development of DMM will require common agreements about extraction data, stakeholder involvement, potential and specific actions, goals, monitoring methods to assess effectiveness, and contingency plans for drought and further response conditions. It is possible that a Board level policy could guide a standard for common agreements that need to be achieved across all subbasins and what specifics need to be developed within each subbasin. It is also possible that a policy does not offer significant enough benefits to be prepared.

Pre-Interview. In advance of the proposed interview and as part of our SVBGSA Outreach and Education, we will be hosting an important and highly informative, virtual DMM Workshop on:



You were contacted yesterday by Ms. Donna Meyers, General Manager of the Salinas Valley Basin Groundwater Sustainability Agency (SVBGSA) about current and potential future discussions regarding demand management measures (DMM) as they relate to implementation of Groundwater Sustainability Plans (GSP) required under the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA).

More specifically, you were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview process to be conducted by the Consensus and Collaboration Program of Sacramento State (CCP), on behalf of the SVBGSA. The purpose of the interview is to gather information from a representative but not exhaustive range of stakeholders and to subsequently provide recommendations about potential and proposed efforts to address DMM in the SVBGSA and associated subbasins. As specialists in the design and implementation of such interview processes, CCP assesses a range of variables that inform decisions by organizational leaders. In this circumstance, a compelling question is whether there is benefit to prepare an Agency-wide policy on DMM and if not, what means might be implemented by the SVBGSA and/or subbasin representatives to address DMM.

Ms. Meyers' letter briefly described the assessment process and CCP's role. CCP is a program of Sacramento State's College of Continuing Education. Since 1992 we have provided facilitation, mediation and public engagement services to hundreds of organizations and thousands of diverse stakeholders on a range of policy topics. Our specialty is providing neutral analysis, design, and facilitation support to multi-stakeholder collaborative efforts that seek to achieve mutually beneficial outcomes.

Acting as a neutral party and having reviewed significant background information about the SVBGSA's SGMA implementation to-date, I have identified you as an excellent candidate to speak with. Should you agree to participate, we will meet via Zoom or phone wherein I will cover a standardized set of questions. Key topics to be covered may include but may not be limited to:

- Understanding and purpose of DMMs
- Local groundwater conditions and steps to achieve required sustainability (as per SGMA)

- Parties interested in and affected by DMM development and implementation
- Benefits and drawbacks of an Agency DMM policy
- Options on how to best develop and implement DMM (if appropriate and/or necessary)

Shortly after I interview you and other individuals, I will prepare a summary report which will be shared with you and will be available on the SVBGSA website. The report will also be shared with the SVBGSA Executive Committee of the Board of Directors (Board), and the SVBGSA Board.

- Analysis of the results with a focus on (1) themes and trends that will likely influence next steps regarding the DMM topic and (2) recommendations for next steps.

Your interview should last around one hour and potentially slightly longer, particularly if you will be interviewed with a small group of other related persons, identified to participate in this effort. All information you provide during the interview will be confidential and proprietary to CCP. Nothing will ever be attributed to a specific person or organization, nor directly shared with anyone else.

Dear Mr. Ainsworth:

I write to express the State Water Resources Control Board's (State Water Board) interest in California American Water Company's (Cal-Am's) application for a coastal development permit for the Monterey Peninsula Water Supply Project (Project). We ask that the Coastal Commission give the Project a full, considered hearing. The State Water Board's interest is in permanently ending unauthorized diversions from the Carmel River, rather than any individual project. The State Water Board supports Cal-Am's and other regional efforts to develop permanent replacement water supplies that sustain only lawful diversions from the Carmel River.

Unlawful diversions have harmed the public trust resources of the Carmel River

As you are aware, after finding that Cal-Am has been diverting more than its entitled share from the Carmel River, the Board issued a cease and desist order requiring Cal-Am to drastically reduce its diversions. Doing so is critically important given that Cal-Am's excessive diversions adversely impacted the public trust resources of the Carmel River. The public trust resources of the Carmel River include the federally threatened South-Central California Coast Steelhead Distinct Population Segment, the federally threatened California red-legged frog, and the candidate western pond turtle, as well as coastal wetlands and riparian vegetative communities.

Protecting the fish, wildlife, and riparian habitat of the Carmel River depends on the development of a reliable replacement water supply that permanently ends unpermitted diversions. The Board has identified that Cal-Am's diversions "constitute the largest single impact to the instream beneficial uses of the river." (State Water Board Order 95-10, p. 25). Review of conditions 14 years later found that diversions from the Carmel River were continuing to have an adverse effect on the fish, wildlife, and riparian habitat,

including the threatened steelhead (State Water Board Order 2009-0060). Diversions from the river were directly contributing to drying out miles of the steelhead's critical habitat in the Carmel River for five to six months of the year.

The State Water Board's orders are still in effect

State Water Board Order 2016-0016 provides that the conditions of the State Water Board's orders remain in effect until "Cal-Am certifies, with supporting documentation, that it has obtained a permanent supply of water that has been substituted for the water illegally diverted from the Carmel River" and the Deputy Director of the State Water Board's Division of Water Rights concurs with the certification.

Cal-Am will not report its water use for Water Year 2021-2022 until February 1, 2023, and therefore the State Water Board is not yet able to determine whether Cal-Am is in compliance with their water rights (including permit terms such as maximum annual diversion limits). Because of the present uncertainty of Cal-Am's compliance, the State Water Board recently denied requests to modify or lift the cease-and-desist order (Eileen Sobeck, letter to David Stoldt, July 28, 2022). As California has just experienced its driest three-year period on record, continued unlawful diversions will cause even greater harm to the Carmel River's protected fish and wildlife.

Cal-Am's long-term water supply remains uncertain

Although Cal-Am and the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District (District) have implemented various measures to reduce diversions from the Carmel River, it is undisputed that Cal-Am has not yet secured a permanent replacement water supply. Cal-Am and the District have made efforts to reduce demand, including programs encouraging conservation by business and residential customers, water efficiency requirements, and tiered conservation rates, and to develop new supplies, such as the Sand City desalination plant, Pebble Beach water recycling facility, and new lawful rights in the Carmel River. Cal-Am currently relies on Pure Water Monterey to produce 3,500 acre-feet per year. The California Public Utilities Commission will consider whether to authorize Cal-Am to enter into a water purchase agreement for the Pure Water Monterey expansion project, which could provide an additional 2,250 acre-feet annually of treated water by 2024 or 2025.

The Pure Water Monterey expansion project may constitute an important component of a permanent replacement water supply, if it is developed and demonstrated to be a reliable, drought-resilient water source. However, based on regional housing needs, source reliability, and the effects of aridification on California's water supplies, the State Water Board believes it is prudent for Cal-Am to pursue additional sources of water that are sustainable and urges the Coastal Commission to consider the proposed desalination facility as a potentially vital municipal water supply that also could help to protect one of the region's most important environmental assets.

The water supply for the Monterey Peninsula remains precarious, and will continue to be so until a long-term, resilient replacement water supply is developed. The conditions of the State Water Board's orders remain in effect, including a prohibition on new water service connections served from the Carmel River. The State Water Board supports Cal-Am's efforts to develop a diverse and drought-resilient water supply portfolio. Desalination that is appropriately permitted and conditioned to protect the environment can be one part of a long-term water supply solution.¹

We appreciate your consideration of these important issues, and State Water Board staff are available for further discussion.

Mr. Luster and members of the Coastal Commission,

As a former Monterey County Planning Commissioner and long-time advocate for the Castroville community, I am writing in in strong support of the Monterey Peninsula Water Supply Project (MPWSP). The MPWSP will provide access to critically-needed, reliable water source for all communities, including my community of Castroville which is suffering from catastrophic salt water intrusion of our drinking supply wells. I urge the California Coastal Commission to approve this project to help ensure that all have access to clean, reliable water in the Monterey Peninsula and Castroville.

California American Water has provided ratepayer assistance programs in Monterey for almost two decades, including ongoing discounts and a hardship program. In their September 2022 update to Coastal Commission staff they committed to sponsoring proposals that will increase the assistance they already give and expand programs for tenants of multi-family buildings living behind master meters.

Decades of drought have created an unprecedented water crisis in our region that threatens everyone in the region, but particularly disenfranchised communities and working-class families. Lack of water has resulted in a building moratorium, exacerbating our affordable housing crisis in the region and forcing workers to drive long distances between jobs and where they can afford to live. Castroville, a disadvantaged community, faces its own drinking water crisis due to seawater intrusion threatening its primary water supply, will see enormous benefit from the MPWSP.

The MPWSP is part of a comprehensive approach to create a long-term, reliable water source through desalination, stormwater capture and water recycling. It will protect the Carmel River ecosystem, supply new water for affordable housing and local jobs, and improve coastal access for local communities. This net-zero GHG emission project will create a permanent, reliable source of water, without placing extra burdens on the Carmel River and without increasing air or industrial pollution in the region.

Please don't let a small but vocal group of NIMBY's prevent an essential water supply project, that will have a transformative impact on so many people, from moving forward.

The Monterey Peninsula has been in dire need of additional drought-proof, reliable water supplies for over 25 years. There's no time left to wait - we desperately need the California Coastal Commission to approve the Monterey Peninsula Water Supply Project.

California is about to enter its wet season, when hopes are high for replenishing lowland rains and mountain snows after its three driest years on record. But, for the fourth year in a row, the state could languish in a drought that is having dire effects on its water resources.

Last week, the National Weather Service projected another warm and dry winter for large parts of the state — with drought persisting or getting worse. Now, experts are sounding the alarm about what a fourth consecutive drought year could mean.

“While California has seen a fourth year of drought as recently as 2012-2016 ... this will be the first drought that includes shortage issues on the Colorado River,” said Michael Anderson, California’s state climatologist with the Department of Water Resources.

The Colorado River, once considered a guaranteed supply for Southern California, is in crisis, with states set to negotiate possible cutbacks to keep Lake Mead from plummeting to dangerously low levels. It is just 150 feet from “dead pool” level, below which water could not flow downstream.

There is some hope that, even if significant precipitation eludes the southern and central portions of California, the northern part could fare better. Here, the Weather Service is calling for equal chances for above- and below-normal precipitation. However, there is plenty of uncertainty in long-range forecasts, and the season will largely be determined by moisture-rich atmospheric river storms: how strong they are, where they land — and where they don’t.

“We’re playing Russian roulette with the weather, and that’s always a bad idea,” said Felicia Marcus, a fellow at Stanford’s Water in the West program and the former chair of the State Water Resources Control Board. ““When the Sierras have been dry, Southern California has been bailed out by the Colorado. We have been lucky, and our system has been based on that luck.”

Bracing for another dry year

The past three years mark California’s third significant drought period of the 21st century — part of the larger climate change-fueled “megadrought” in the West that is now in its 23rd year, 19 of which have been dry.

October 2019 through September 2022 — the past three water years combined — was California’s driest such period on record. In that time, much of northern California missed more than a year’s worth of precipitation.

The long, hot summer of 2021 was marked by shrinking reservoirs and rapidly intensifying drought, as the state recorded its warmest June through September since 1895.

“2021 was about as bad as it gets — the atmosphere was at an all-time record dryness,” said Jeffrey Mount, a senior fellow at the Public Policy Institute of California’s Water Policy Center.

The 2022 dry season also brought below-normal precipitation in most parts of the state.

Adding another parched year on top of the past three could put the state in uncharted territory.

“If we get another 2021, we will be plowing new ground,” he said. “I don’t want to say we are ready, but we are certainly preparing for it.”

No time to lose

With each passing year, rising temperatures are playing an increasingly significant role in the water supply picture. Over the next 20 years, California could lose 10 percent of its water supply as the atmosphere, soils and plants become ever more thirsty, according to a [report](#) from the office of Gov. Gavin Newsom (D).

Mount and Marcus said large metropolitan areas can probably weather another drought year, having invested billions in becoming more drought resilient in recent years.

But farmers, rural towns and ecosystems “will continue to get hammered in heartbreaking ways,” Marcus said.

Hundreds of thousands of acres of California farmland were fallowed this year. Some fish species, like delta smelt, have become functionally extinct, Mount said, meaning they are only found in hatcheries.

“Freshwater ecosystems are really in bad shape because of essentially 10 years of drought,” he said. 2017 and 2019 were the only wet years of the past decade.

Marcus said conservation efforts, like replacing lawns and fixing leaks, are the fastest, cheapest way to save water and should be expanded without delay, regardless of what the coming year brings. Longer-term solutions involve paying farmers to convert land to other uses, and [recharging depleted groundwater](#) reserves after intense storms.

“If you just hold back more in the normal times, you’ll have enough to keep fish alive during dry years and still deliver water to farms and cities,” Marcus said.

Rising flood risk, even during droughts

While scientists and planners are most worried about drought, there is also growing concern about extreme precipitation and flooding amid this dry spell. The past decade has seen wet extremes arrive both during and between drought years, and the California Department of Water Resources is also gearing up for potential flooding.

In 2017, the state swung from depleted reservoirs to what UCLA climate scientist Daniel Swain called “essentially the wettest winter in modern history in parts of northern California” at a recent symposium hosted by the Department of Water Resources. A January 2021 atmospheric river produced post-wildfire flooding and mudslides, an event that became one of the nation’s billion-dollar weather disasters. [Water year 2022](#) — Oct. 1, 2021, through Sept. 30 — also saw wild swings between record wet and record dry conditions. And over the broader region, the West has seen recent impactful flooding in [Yellowstone National Park](#), [Las Vegas](#) and [Death Valley](#).

“We expect to see a significant increase in both drought and flood severity in a warming climate,” Swain said during his talk at the symposium. “This is in fact exactly what climate models suggest should be emerging right around now and continuing to amplify through the century.”

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

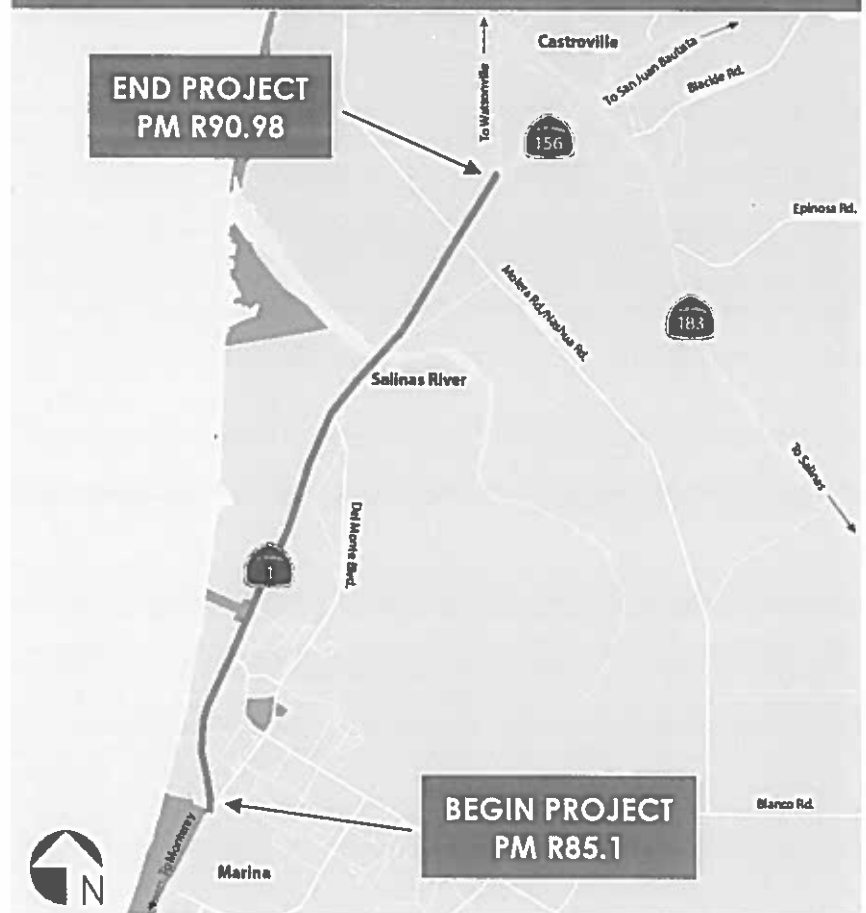
The Marina to Castroville Capital Preventative Maintenance Project is located on Highway 1 in Monterey County, from the South Marina Overhead to the SR 1/156 Junction. The purpose of this project is to preserve and extend the service life of the existing pavement, gore areas and other facilities. The project will restore culverts, replace Traffic Management System elements, rehabilitate lighting, and upgrade guard railing to current standards. This projects outcome will allow for more effective traffic management, improved ride quality for road users, and reduce the maintenance workers exposure to high-speed traffic on the road by improving the environment for maintenance personnel and the traveling public.

COMMUNITY

The project traverses a largely rural agricultural environment between the City of Marina and Castroville. The highway, also known as Cabrillo Highway, is a freeway that carries interregional tourism and commerce traffic, crosses the Salinas River, runs parallel to the Marina coastline, and connects to California State University Monterey Bay to the south.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom declared a statewide emergency arising from the coronavirus (COVID-19); and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20 suspending certain provisions of the Brown Act pertaining to teleconferenced meetings; and

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21 which indicated that Executive Order N-29-20's authorization for holding virtual meetings would expire on September 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021, Governor Newsom signed AB 361 (Rivas) as urgency legislation effective immediately, which provides that legislative bodies may continue to meet remotely during a declared State of Emergency subject to certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, AB 361 amends the Brown Act (Government Code section 54953) to add the following provision:

(e)(1) A local agency may use teleconferencing without complying with the requirements of paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) if the legislative body complies with the requirements of paragraph (2) of this subdivision in any of the following circumstances:

(B) The legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, AB 361 amends the Brown Act (Government Code section 54953) to add the following provision:

(3) If a state of emergency remains active, or state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, in order to continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b), the legislative body shall, not later than 30 days after teleconferencing for the first time pursuant to subparagraph (A), (B), or (C) of paragraph (1), and every 30 days thereafter, make the following findings by majority vote:

(A) The legislative body has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency.

(B) Any of the following circumstances exist:

(C) The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Castroville Community Services District finds that the Governor's March 4, 2020, declaration of a state of emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic remains active.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Board of Directors of the Castroville Community Services District finds that due to the state of emergency meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees and/or the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person for Board meetings and standing committee meetings due to the prevalence of the Delta variant of the COVID-19 virus, the indoor setting of meeting facilities, the potential presence of unvaccinated individuals attending meetings, the potential for noncompliance with mask wearing requirements, and desire to protect the health of immuno-compromised trustee(s), staff and the public.

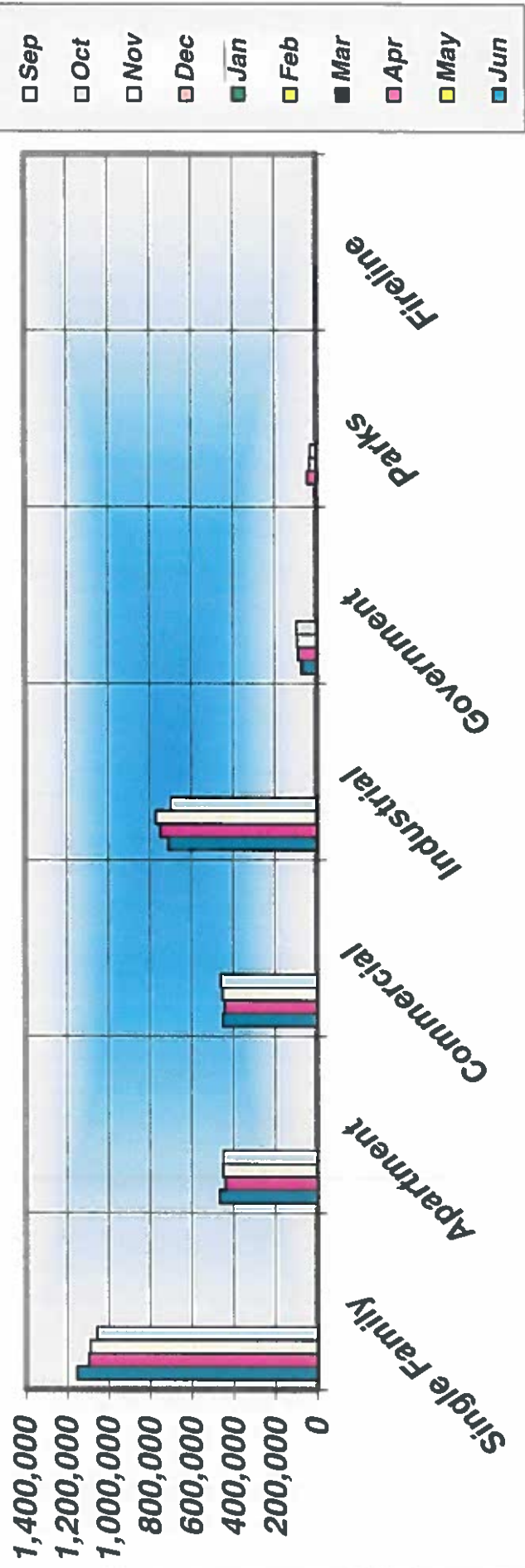

Pooled Money Investment Account Monthly Portfolio Composition ⁽¹⁾ 09/30/22 \$222.9 billion

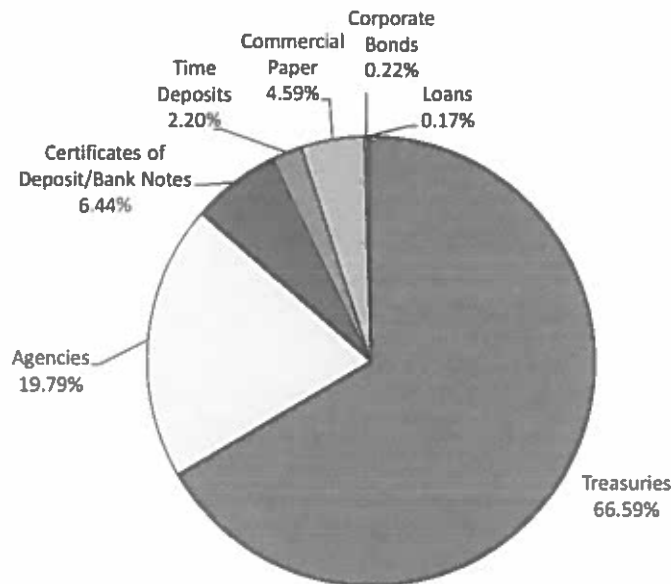
